Musical Theatre Area

Program Description

The BFA Musical Theatre program is designed to train and prepare students for successful entrance into the professional world of musical theatre. We strive to train the total artist through the rigorous study of acting, singing, and dancing technique. Upon completion of the BFA Musical Theatre degree, students will enter the industry as disciplined, focused, skillful artists that lead diverse careers as stage performers, arts educators, arts advocates and theorists of the discipline. Over the four-year matriculation through the BFA Musical Theatre program students take both practical and theoretical courses that encourage masterful application of the discipline.

Attendance Policy

Training and assessment in the BFA Musical Theatre program are based on your ability to synthesize dance technique, singing, acting, music theory application, and historical knowledge through your performances. The MT Area faculty understands that life happens. Your presence in every class, lesson, rehearsal, and studio is essential to the successful completion of the BFA in Musical Theatre. **Attendance is mandatory.** Work schedules, HU administration needs, HU administration visits, day of illness, travel schedules, and dining schedules are not valid reasons for missing class.

Absences from major classes shall be deemed excused under the following circumstances.

- 1. **Medical Emergency** An official letter of service from the Howard University Student Health Services Center or medical provider must accompany the student upon return to classes.
- 2. **Death** Official documentation of proof of attendance to services must accompany the student upon return to classes. This documentation must be submitted within 5 days of the student's return.

Uniform Policy

In ALL performance based technique classes we adhere to a professional standard. All BFA Musical Theatre majors are required to wear black attire as detailed in the area handbook. Performance technique classes include all Acting, Dance, Vocal Studio and MT Techniques courses. Attire should show the line of the body.

Unacceptable attire includes: JEANS, MID-DRIFT TOPS, HALF SHIRTS, GRAPHIC TEES, LOGO TEES, LONG FINGER NAILS. Hairstyles should be neat and should not interfere with the work. Rubber soled sneakers are permissible for Acting Techniques 1 & 2. Please note, you will be dismissed from class for lack of compliance.

PLEASE NOTE: The vocal studio is a performance based class, and as a result you must be appropriately dressed according to the dress code above. As well, please be mindful that in ALL classes, the length and fit of skirt/shorts should be appropriate for the academic space.

Course Goal:

To develop musical understanding and awareness through investigation of the fundamental elements of music.

Course objectives:

- 1. Define, identify, analyze, and manipulate basic musical elements
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge and skills relevant to Musical Theatre
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to express musical ideas through written, aural, and oral communication

Course Content:

THMT041 includes the study of pitch, duration, meter and time signature, major and minor scales, key signatures, melodic and harmonic intervals, triads, nonharmonic tones, cadences, song form, and important terms that relate to the topics.

Instructor Expectations and Professionalism

Participation - Students are expected to be present and prepared at all class meetings. Active participation is required. Participation includes - asking questions, participating in discussions, responding to instructor questions, promptness, and general overall attention to the class session.
